# Students compete in documentary contest

ecently, 1,000 local secondary students took part in the 'Think Again' Awards Documentary Making Competition. The participating teams were given 3 themes to choose from ('sports and health', 'society and culture' and 'science, technology and the environment') ... (continued inside)



... and were asked to make a 5-10 minute documentary in English.

The documentaries were judged by people from the film industry and educational organisations. Participants, schoolteachers and organisers were also able to vote online for the People's Choice Awards.

The aims of the competition were to motivate students to come up with fresh ideas, to inspire students to 'think again' about the world they live in, and to test their analytical, presentation and technical skills.

D10: Tell us about the documentary making process


